APIDA Center recognizes APIDA labor movements!

On September 5, 2022, the campus will be closed for Labor Day, an annual celebration of workers and their achievements. American labor movements have fought for safe working conditions, reasonable hours, fair wages, support for injured employees, retirement benefits, and an end to child labor.

Our APIDA history is strongly tied to labor - Early Asian American immigrants came to this country to work; they were also subjected to anti-Asian hate because they were perceived to be economic threats. APIDA labor activists have had to fight and are continuing to fight for a myriad of rights.

In 1990, APIDA labor activists formed the <u>Asian Pacific American Alliance (APALA)</u>, the first and only national organization of APIDA workers committed to advancing worker immigrant, and civil rights. They were concerned about sweatshops, child labor, and slave labor scandals. In 1992, over 500 labor activists from across the nation met in Washington, D.C. for the founding of APALA. This first convention was chaired by Katie Quan. The first APALA president was Kent Wong. The <u>San Diego chapter of APALA</u> is one of APALA's 13 chapters.
