

### Support our UndocCommunity!

Did you know that 1 out of 8 Asian immigrants is undocumented? California has the largest number of undocumented Asian Americans. The top three countries of origin are India, China, and the Philippines.

The APIDA Center believes that the goals of education are to advance knowledge and improve society. We are committed to providing learning opportunities for all of our students. The Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program began in 2012 and has positively impacted over 700,000 undocumented immigrants. On October 5th, a federal appeals court upheld a district ruling finding the DACA program unlawful; DACA is expected to go to the Supreme Court for a final decision.

#### **APIDA Center celebrates San Diego film festivals!**


San Diego is the home to not one but two major APIDA film festivals: <u>San</u> <u>Diego Asian Film Festival</u> (SDAFF) and <u>San Diego Filipino Film</u> <u>Festival</u> (SDFF). Film festivals are important platforms for many independent filmmakers as they provide an opportunity to show and promote their work. They are essential vehicles for amplifying diverse stories.

In 2000, Lee Ann Kim, a former San Diego TV journalist, launched the first San Diego Asian Film Festival. Originally, it was first organized as a fundraiser by the Asian American Journalists Association. Due to its success, Kim, along with other community leaders, formed the Pacific Arts Movement and established the San Diego Asian Film Festival as its own entity. What started as a small showing of Asian/APIDA films has transformed into a 10-day showcase with over 15,000 attendees per year. Today, the San Diego Asian Film Festival has grown to be nationally recognized as one of the largest Asian film festivals on the west coast. The 23rd San Diego Asian Film Festival is on November 3-12, 2022. (Fun Fact: SDSU Associate Professor, Dr. **Brian Hu**, is the Artistic Director for Pacific Arts Movement.)

In 2018, Benito Bautista and Emma Francisco founded <u>San Diego Filipino</u> <u>Cinema</u> (SDFC) with the goal of amplifying the global experiences faced by Filipinos living in the U.S, Philippines, and as migrants abroad. In 2021, SDFC launched the first San Diego Filipino Film Festival with over 40 in-person and 30 online films. This year, the San Diego Filipino Film Festival takes place October 13-18, 2022 at the AMC Otay Ranch Town Center. (Fun Fact: In 2020, the APIDA Center hosted Benito Bautista as one of our Filipinx American History Month speakers.)

Not only are these film festivals putting San Diego on the map, but they are important spaces for APIDA cultural storytelling.

# **APIDA Center Highlights: News to Know!**



### **APIDA Center hosts second week of FAHM!**

For <u>FAHM</u>, each Sunday, the APIDA Center will share a social media campaign. This week, we shared historical examples of <u>Black and Fil-Am</u> <u>Solidarity</u>.

On Monday, October 10, we learned about Fil-Am feminist-artist, <u>Pacita</u> <u>Abad</u> who was an "ambassador of color" and had created over 4500 works. She said, "I have a social responsibility for my painting, to try to make our world a little better." After learning about Abad, we made art inspired by her. The students did an amazing job!

On Wednesday, October 12, we watched the last three episodes of "Out of the Boondocks," a docuseries about Fil-Am creativity in San Diego. Afterwards, we discussed what it means to be Fil-Am and the importance of representation.



## **APIDA Center hosted Shannon Cristobal!**

On October 12, the APIDA Center hosted <u>Shannon Cristobal</u> who was this year's Dr. Rey Monzon Data Lecture. Every FAHM, the APIDA Center is committed to recognizing esteemed colleague, Dr. <u>Rey Monzon</u> (1957-2021). Cristobal gave an informative lecture about Filipinx foodways, culinary colonialism, culinary assimilation, survival gardens as historical resistance, etc. She encourages us to examine this question: What is the history behind recipes and food? So far, this was our best attended event this year - We had over 85 people attend this online lecture.



## APIDA Center and Black Resource Center hosted Black-Filipinx American student experience panel!

On October 13, the APIDA Center and the Black Resource Center collaborated to host a <u>panel</u> of Black-Filipinx American students: **Caili Anderson, Ellyse Brimmo**, and **Rodney Speight**. We talked about the challenges of being bi-racial and the process of leaning into one culture and learning about another. We also discussed the challenges of being minoritized in multiple communities and the how the Model Minority Theory serves as a racial wedge between the APIDA and Black communities. In addition, we shared stories of cultural pride and celebrated diversity.



#### APIDA Center hosted Dr. Chitra Divakaruni!

On October 13, the APIDA Center hosted award-winning author, activist, and professor: Dr. <u>Chitra Divarkaruni</u>. Dr. Divarkaruni is the author of over 20 books, mostly about South Asian/South Asian American women. She had a busy day at SDSU. First, she visited a women's studies class. Then, she mingled with students at the APIDA Center. And then finally, she gave a talk entitled "Unsilenced: Women's Voices in Indian and Diasporic Literature." We were so lucky to be able to be in conversation with her. She talked about community secrets, authenticity, representation, women and immigrant narratives, and more.

- Asian Americans Advancing Justice works to advance human and civil rights for APIDA communities. They are seeking student interns interested in gaining firsthand experience in civil rights advocacy. Interns are expected to commit to 16-20 hours per week during the 2022 winter or 2021 spring semesters. Specific start and end dates are flexible. Summer internships are full-time (40 hours per week) over a ten-week period. Internships are virtual. Applicants are eligible to apply for a modest stipend based upon demonstrated financial need.

### Scholarships

#### Please research criteria and deadlines.

- The <u>Ruthie Brown Scholarship</u> is offering one \$5000 scholarship to a BIPOC student who is working full or part time and who has a disability or is a non-traditional study. Apply by November 1, 2022.
- The <u>Sikora Drake STEM Scholarship</u> supports minority students so they can pursue higher education in STEM. Any first-generation, BIPOC, female identifying, and/or LGBTQ+ student who is pursuing a degree in STEM may apply for this scholarship. Apply by November 1, 2022.
- Pacific Coast Medical Billing & Coding is offering a <u>Female</u> <u>Empowerment Scholarship</u> which awards \$1500 to a BIPOC, female student. Apply by November 1, 2022.
- The <u>Small Seed Big Flower Scholarship</u> awards \$1015 to one firstgeneration BIPOC undergraduate student. Apply by November 15. 2022.
- LEAD Filipino is hosting the <u>Mama Verang and Lola Remi Scholarship</u> <u>Fund (Lola Scholarship Fund)</u>. They are awarding three scholarships ranging from \$990-1020 for Filipino American undergraduate and graduate students. Apply by December 1, 2022.
