## Director's Message from Dr. Loh-Hagan

The SDSU APIDA Center stands united with the APIDA community following the mass shootings in Monterey Park, Half Moon Bay, and Oakland. Our hearts go out to all those affected by these senseless acts of violence.

A day of collective celebration has been turned into a day of collective mourning. But still, we fight for our right to celebrate our holidays and culture without fear. On this Lunar New Year day, we wish for everyone to be surrounded by love, safety, and community.

#### In solidarity with the APIDA community!

This past week, we have suffered tragedy upon tragedy. There were three mass shootings within three days - all in California: Monterey Park (1-21-23), Half Moon Bay (1-23-23), and Oakland (1-23-23). Now, more than ever, we need to stand together as one SDSU community to combat the root causes of these senseless acts of violence.

On January 22, President **Adela de la Torre**, Vice President **J. Luke Wood**, Interim Chief of Police **Gregory Murphy**, and myself sent a <u>university-wide email</u> responding to this tragedy and offering support. Please give yourself time and space to feel whatever you need to feel. The APIDA Center is here for anyone who needs assistance.

#### **APIDA Center celebrates Monterey Park!**

In this time of mourning, we reflect and uplift the Asian American community and history of Monterey Park. Monterey Park is a historic ethnoburb located in the San Gabriel Valley near Los Angeles. An "ethnoburb" is a suburb with a high population of immigrants or refugees. In ethnoburbs, businesses, schools, and community spaces address the cultural needs of its residents. Monterey Park is home to a high concentration of Chinese immigrants from Hong Kong, Taiwan, and China. Additionally, Vietnamese, Japanese, Filipinx, and Latinx immigrants add to the vibrant cultural composition of the Monterey Park community. This rich diversity is a result of waves of immigration, decades of activism, and collective fights against assimilation and cultural erasure.

In early U.S. history, exclusion acts barred many Asians from immigrating. The Immigration and Nationality Act of 1965 revoked decades of exclusion and supported family reunification and skilled labor. Thousands of Asian immigrants arrived in the United States, resulting in the overcrowding of Los Angeles' Chinatown. This led to a population of Chinese residents resettling in Monterey Park.

In the 1970s, Frederic Hseih (1945-1999), a Chinese American realtor and investor, purchased property and referred to Monterey Park as the next, "Chinese Beverly Hills." For awhile, Monterey Park held the nickname "Little Taipei," reflecting the largely Taiwanese population who arrived in the 1970s. In the 1980s, immigrants from Hong Kong and Taiwan bought properties in Monterey Park and developed Chinese restaurants, shops, language schools, and community organizations. (Fun Fact: Boba tea was first brought to the United States in the 1990s by Taiwanese immigrants in the San Gabriel Valley.)

While Asian culture flourished in Monterey Park, tensions heightened regarding the growth Chinese signs displayed across the suburb. White dissenters argued for a ban of non-English signs, education, etc. Lily Lee Chen (born 1936) led the fight against the English-only movement in the city, and in 1983, the city made history by electing her mayor of Monterey Park. (She became the first Chinese American female mayor in the United States.) Following her legacy, Judy Chu (born 1953), a school board member in the 1980s, participated in the "Coalition for Harmony" to promote cross-cultural understanding. Chu became the first Chinese American woman elected to Congress in 2009.

Over time, Non-Asian residents either left the ethnoburb or stayed and developed multi-racial coalitions in solidarity with the APIDA community. Today the population of 60,000 in Monterey Park is two-thirds Asian with 73% of residents speaking a language other than English at home.

On January 21, 2023, a gunman fatally shot 11 people and injured 10 at the Star Ballroom Dance Studio in Monterey Park. We honor the lives of: Xiujuan Yu, Hongying Jian, Lilian Li, Mymy Nhan, Muoi Dai Ung, Diana Man Ling Tom, Wen-Tau Yu, Valentino Marcos Alvero, Ming Wei Ma, Yu-Lun Kao, and Chia Ling Yau.


Despite this time of uncertainty and loss of safety, APIDA communities like Monterey Park will continue to love, rise, thrive, support, heal, and build power.

# **APIDA Center hosts Narcan training!**

Did you know that over 150 people die every day from overdoses related to synthetic opioids like fentanyl? Fentanyl is 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine. Naloxone or NARCAN is a life-saving medication that can reverse an overdose from opioids, when given in time. The APIDA Center hosted a NARCAN info session and training on Monday, January 23rd. We are grateful to **Aaron Brown** from Well-Being & Health Promotion for providing the training. Participants will get access to NARCAN. We will be hosting more trainings later this semester.
