Know our histories to know ourselves!



APIDA Center celebrates Susan Anh Cuddy!

There are so many APIDA women to honor during Women's History Month. For this issue, the APIDA Center is amplifying **Susan Anh Cuddy.** Cuddy was a daughter of Korean immigrants, who were the first married Korean couple to immigrate to the United States in 1902. In 1915, Cuddy was born in Los Angeles where she played baseball in high school and at Los Angeles City College, facing adversity in a maledominated athletic field.

Growing up, Cuddy drew inspiration from her parents who fought to liberate Korea from Japanese colonization, a period of suppression of Korean civil liberties, punishment of dissenters, and coercion of Korean women into sexual exploitation known as "comfort women" to the Japanese military. In 1937, Cuddy's father, an avid advocate for Korean liberation, was arrested, tortured, and killed by Japanese police in Seoul. This sparked a drive in Cuddy to fight against the Japanese imperialists in the name of her father. In 1942, when the Japanese imperialists attacked Pearl Harbor in Hawaii, the U.S. military expanded to include women through the Women's Reserve of the U.S Naval Reserve WAVES program. When Cuddy applied to this program, she was initially rejected because of her race. Cuddy persisted and reapplied.

In 1942, she was admitted into the WAVES programs and became the first Korean-born and first female gunnery officer. She became a lieutenant and worked for the U.S Navy Intelligence, the Library of Congress, the National Security Agency, and the Department of Defense. She was met with suspicions because of her race, and was excluded her from handling classified documents. However, Cuddy demonstrated her skill and ability which led to her title as the chief intelligence officer of a code-breaking department.

In 1947, she challenged anti-miscegenation laws in Virginia and married a White man. During the era of segregation, she would sit in the back of the bus and used "colored" restrooms in solidarity with the Black community. Despite her fair skin and proximity to Whiteness, she demonstrated allyship. She devoted the remainder of her life to Korean American activism and Breast Cancer Awareness (as a survivor herself). In 2003, Cuddy was recognized as the Woman of the Year by the State Assembly of California of District 28. In 2006, she received the American Courage award from the Asian American Justice Center in Washington D.C.

And the most funnest of all facts is that Cuddy was an alumnus of San Diego State University, having graduated in 1940 with a degree in Sociology! Go SDSU!
