Know APIDA History!



APIDA Center recognizes Sikh and Japanese farming legacy!

From the early 1900s-1960s, Asian and Pacific immigration has led to large communities of APIDA agricultural workers. Chinese, Filipino, Japanese, and Sikh farmworkers migrated to the West Coast. They worked and saved money to eventually purchase their own agricultural plots. Many of these immigrants came to the United States with farming skills and knowledge from their home countries. As such, Sikh and Japanese farmworkers significantly developed the agricultural landscape in Southern California.

Sikh farm workers have viewed their relationship with tending the land and providing food to their communities as an important value. In fact, agricultural labor is not just a job, it's a reflection of faith. Sikh agricultural workers have contributed to the harvest of raisins, almonds, lettuce, cotton and peaches across California. In 1978, Didar Singh Bains (1938-2022), a Sikh farmworker, became the largest independent peach farmer in California. He was renowned for being the "Peach King." He was famous for his farm in Yuba City, where he employed hundreds of Sikh refugees following the Sikh massacre in India in 1984.

Japanese workers also heavily impacted agricultural economy. In Oceanside, the famous Yasukochi farms have survived four generations of Japanese-owned farming. In 1924, the Yasukochi family became known as the "King of Chiles" due to their innovative chile-dehydrating equipment and techniques. After the 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor, the Yasukochis were incarcerated in camps in New Mexico and Arizona. In their absence, Mr. Gray, an Escondido school teacher, tended to the farms until they were able to return. Every year since, the Yasukochi family would deliver some of their fresh harvest to Mr. Gray to express gratitude for his act of service.

It is important to recognize the APIDA communities that have tended to the land, built economic pathways, and fed thousands through their agricultural labor.
