Our Inaugural South East Asian American Festival!

We did it! We hosted our first South East Asian American (SEAA) Festival. April is a significant month for Southeast Asian Americans: (1) Thai, Laotian, Cambodian New Year, (2) Hmong Heritage Month, (3) Laotian Heritage Month, (4) Black Friday (Fall of Saigon), and more.

Many thanks to Student Success Fee grants, led by **Krissa Jackson**, for their support in promoting a festival consisting of several weeks of events including Laotian dancing, "The Donut King" screening, Hmong embroidery (Paj Ntaub) workshops, dragon boat raciing, and more. This was a testament to the power of little ideas and the life these ideas take when nurtured. In the future, we will continue to put concerted effort into designating April as an opportunity to celebrate South East Asian American histories and heritages.

APIDA Center learns about dragon boat racing in San Diego!

On Sunday, April 14, 2024, the APIDA Center, with generous funds from the SDSU Student Success Fee program, hosted a <u>Dragon Boat Racing</u> <u>Program</u> in partnership with the San Diego Dragon Boat Team and UCSD Dragon Boat Team. (Many thanks to **Krissa Jackson**, APIDA Center Student Assistant, for leading this project.) Twenty SDSU students spent a day in the sun at Fiesta Island participating in this Asian tradition; dragon boat racing is popular in Southeast Asia but originated from China.

From 770-476 BC, the emergence of dragon boat racing was documented in the Wu and Yue provinces of China. This activity aimed to appease river spirits and was practiced during the Spring and Autumn seasons. In ancient Chinese agricultural traditions, dragon boats would be used to celebrate the planting process of the rice crop during the summer solstice. Over time, this practice spread across Southeast Asia and across the globe. Today, approximately 60 countries participate in the sport; Singapore and Malaysia celebrate a Dragon Boat Festival.

In addition, boat racing has been utilized for naval training in China and is a fun competitive sport. Stylistically, dragon boat racing is known for its synchronized rowing that matches the tune of a drummer who sits at the front of the boat. These narrow boats are decorated with dragon designs which represent good luck, strength, and power. With this cultural symbol, the rowers embody the values of the Chinese dragon. In 1976, the dragon boat competition was established in Hong Kong.

In 1983, Singapore gifted the city of San Diego three dragon boats. In 1984, San Diego made history by claiming the world championship, defeating 14 other countries. This inaugural win marked the first time that a Western nation has won in the 2,000 years of the dragon boat racing sport. In 1992, the first women's team of San Diego won silver medals from international competitions in Singapore and Hong Kong.

APIDA Center learns about Paj Ntaub!

Paj Ntaub (prounounced /pun-dow/) is a Hmong word that means "flower cloth." It refers to Hmong embroidery, or techniques used by Hmong women to decorate cloth for clothing. It can include cross-stitching, applique, and story cloth. On, April 17th, the APIDA Center hosted two events to learn more about this Hmong art tradition. First, Mama Suzanne Thao, a Hmong elder, zoomed in from Minnesota to share the history of Hmong, the traditions of Paj Ntaub, and her own personal refugee story. This was an extremely moving event. Mama Suzanne fled from war and lived in refugee camps before migrating to the United States - the whole time she carried her stitching. More importantly, she carried her knowledge and skills with her and has committed her life to teaching the younger generations about Paj Ntaub. Second, in a repeat performance, we invited April Yang back to talk about how the current generation is preserving Paj Ntaub. Yang led a workshop where students learned to cross-stitch basic Hmong designs. Standby for more!
